


The Bible is the world's bestselling book. Inside the cover we find an ancient library, which forms one big story with a powerful message for today.

The Bible is a library of books



A collection of books accepted as genuine. 'Canon' comes from a Greek word meaning 'rule' or 'standard'. The biblical canon has unique authority that sets the standard.

There are 66 core books in the Christian Bible. Catholic and Orthodox traditions also include a second tier of books, known as the Deuterocanon or the Apocrypha.



Can we trust the books that make up the Bible?

I love all the different writings in the Bible – poetry, love songs, stories, letters. There's so much to explore. Over the years, I've come to believe these books have unique authority. They guide us into God's truth. Imagine the Bible as like a DIY spirit level. It reveals what's straight or crooked. The Bible isn't just true. It's a standard that decides whether other ideas are true or not.

But why were certain books included in the Bible and others left out?

The core 39 books that we call the Old Testament were considered to have unique authority by the time of Jesus. They were the Bible that Jesus himself knew and loved. He quoted them when he was tempted and when he was teaching people. He believed they had special authority. Throughout the Old Testament, God tells his people to write down his words and deeds so they can be preserved for future generations – including us. That's why I trust the Old Testament, even though I still find some passages hard.

The New Testament was developed because of Jesus. The four Gospels by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John record what Jesus said and did; the letters unpack what it all meant for the first Christians – and for us. I've heard conspiracy theories which claim the Church suppressed the real truth about Jesus. But other books and 'gospels' that came later were not based on eyewitness evidence, so they lacked credibility. For example, the so-called 'Gospel of Thomas' claims that Jesus taught that women must become men to enter God's kingdom. I'm so glad that book was not included in the Bible, aren't you? The 27 books in the New Testament safeguard the real truth about Jesus.





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The Bible includes many flawed characters who told lies, betrayed trust, and even committed murder. But their small stories are gathered up into one big story that centres on Jesus Christ.

How to understand a passage in the Bible?

Some stories in the Bible date back to the middle of the Bronze Age – perhaps up to 1,800 years before Jesus was born. It's called the Old Testament for good reason! So, it helps to appreciate the original context and cultural background. As the saying goes:

'If you take a text out of context, you'll be left with a con!'

Here's two simple questions you can ask of any passage to get the most out of it:

What?

What did it mean in it's original context?

Now what?

Now, what does this passage mean for my life today?

The Bible is God's revelation

Miraculous things happen when ordinary people open the Bible.

Why might this be?

Reflect on a claim in the New Testament.

Here it is in several different translations:

All Scripture is inspired by God (GNB)

All Scripture is God-breathed (NIV)

Everything in the Scriptures is God's Word (CEV)

What might this mean?

God didn't write the Bible. He used over 40 human authors to do that. And their personalities and cultural contexts shine through. But God inspired what they wrote so that ultimately their words communicate his truth.

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Why trust the Bible


There are some challenging passages and apparent contradictions in the Bible. It's not an easy read. But there are good reasons to believe that the Bible is God's inspired truth:

Historical evidence

Some discoveries by archaeologists show that places mentioned in the Bible really existed – for example, Hezekiah's tunnel in the Old Testament and the Pool of Siloam in the New Testament.

Messiah's endorsement

Jesus trusted the Old Testament and promised that the Holy Spirit would reveal further truths, which we have in the New Testament.



Ancient predictions

The Old Testament foretold what would happen centuries later – a great ruler would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5), pierced to death and raised to life (Isaiah 53).

Special status

The Apostle Paul claimed that all Scripture is inspired by God (2 Timothy 3.16) – and the Apostle Peter considered Paul's letters to be Scripture too, even if they are 'hard to understand' (2 Peter 3.15–16).

Transforming power

The Bible's values and truths have shaped entire civilisations, and millions of people have found that God speaks to them through the Bible. Why not give it a try yourself?
